Learning Print Convention

It's good for children early on to learn about print conventions. This may be done and taught in a number of different ways, including daily interactions either at home or in the classroom.

While reading a story (or magazine or newspaper) at home, try to label the different aspects/elements represented:
Front cover, back cover, illustrator, illustration, photographer, title, alphabet letters, letter form, symbols/symbolic representations, left to right progression, last word on page, lines on the page, etc.

ABC Developmentally App.

Creating a print rich environment of which sparks interest and curiosity amongst the kids is key. Try to promote fluency amongst children in naming the alphabet. Activities: Name of the day, Alphabet letter sorting game, alphabet chart game.

Things to remember or Be aware of:

Infants-Preschoolers have an innate capability to see and hear patterns, this aids in brain development. Print recognition will involve this skill.

** Printscript, manuscript, or D'Nealian print: Letter forms may vary from community to community. Make sure to be aware of the printscript in your child kinder-first grade classes. <St. 5>

Printing child's name at top of page-daily use of printscript.

When a child asks for help- stand behind them and write/trace/guide over their shoulder when possible.

Dictation: follow child's word order as closely as possible. <St. 1>

Daily Life print:

Becoming aware of the print around them to satisfy their daily needs. (Exit signs, recipes, etc.) <St. 1>
